Old School Hall: Work on the kitchen refurbishment is now scheduled to begin on 21st November. As this involves the stripping out of the old kitchen and replastering, there will be some disruption to users. The kitchen will not be available for use from 21st November. The work is planned to be completed by Christmas ands it is anticipated that the hall (apart from the kitchen) will be available for use as normal during this period. We are sure that you will consider the inconvenience well worth it as you will see if you join us for mulled wine and mince pies after Carols on the Green on 20th December.

Playing Fields: The contractors laying the new water main along the Rye Road are using the car park as a depot for their equipment. Once they have completed the project they will leave us with a much nicer car park – with no potholes!! Incidentally, the polythene barrier by the side of the road is for the protection of the Greater Crested Newts who would, otherwise, fall into the trenches.

Remembrance Sunday: There were about 150 people at the Cenotaph for the moving service of Remembrance. Wreaths were laid on behalf of the Parish Council, the Social Club and the Baptist Church. Many personal poppies and crosses were also added.

Mary Bicker 1933-2011

Mary was born in Folkestone in 1933. Her mother was sometimes in poor health, so her grandmother played an important part in Mary's upbringing. Later Mary moved to Cheam, in Surrey, to stay with her Auntie Ann. After leaving school she began employment as house-keeper and nanny for the local doctor. Later, when her mother was recovering from an operation, Mary moved back home to help out with the other children. After the war she met Albert, who lived nearby at Elham. Mary and Albert had met when he was on leave from the army.

They were married in Folkestone in 1953. Albert was almost 20 years older than Mary. They moved to East Peckham for a while when they were offered a cottage and work on a farm. Ted and Bob were born there.

In 1959 they moved into a cottage at Downgate in Sandhurst, where Kathy, Christine, David and Audrey were added to their family.

When Albert retired, around 1977, they moved to No.9, Linkhill, where he continued to practice his love of gardening, a task happily shared in by Mary. Mary was delighted when the family bought her a moped in 1981. She took a course at Angley, learning to ride, and very soon became a '50cc mobile feature' of the village, sometimes venturing as far as Headcorn station and even to Crowborough. Sadly, Albert died in June 1992. Quite amazingly at that time Mary continued to participate as a member of the adult Confirmation discussion group which we were holding at the Rectory. It had quite an illustrious membership, each of them contributing hugely to the interesting spiritual development which we shared in together. The Confirmation by the Bishop of Dover took place at St. Nicholas on Advent Sunday, November 29th 1992. Mary was 59 at the time.

Mary was always a keen supporter of Church activities, helping out at every event, and particularly enjoying the monthly Family Services. She would usually be found working behind the scenes at most village events as well, especially with the Friendship Club, lunches at the Baptist Church, and as an enthusiastic member of the Horticultural Society. Her little garden was surprisingly impressive when she opened it for the public from time to time, with others around the village. Somehow she did not discover for many years that she was almost completely blind in one eye.

She greatly deserved the day-trips and coach holidays which she took most years, most recently visiting the Olympic Stadium this September. She is among just a few people who could generate the reflection of so much cheerfulness and love. Mary was laid to rest in the churchyard in a grave shared with Albert, having lived as a widow for almost 20 years. We give thanks to God for all that she meant to so many people in the community.

Three brave young men receive awards

About 50 villagers, local politicians and senior police officers gathered on Tuesday 8 November in the Old School Hall to honour three brave young men whose prompt and selfless actions at the scene of a head-on crash at Linkhill last April saved the lives of four people. David Smith of the Linkhill Road Group, and first on the scene to countless collisions outside his and his wife Jeanne's house over the years, described how his neighbour Mike Jacques and Wayne Thistleton extinguished the fires which broke out in the two vehicles and how Mike and PC Lionel Kelly got into the car of the trapped driver, Amanda Maidment, and helped prevent further injury. Mrs Elizabeth Thomas, Mayor of Tunbridge Wells Borough Council, then presented Mike and Wayne with awards from the Royal Humane Society in recognition of their bravery. Amanda's daughter Emma, who along with her sister Charlotte was able to escape from the car, was at the ceremony with her mother and sister, and accepted PC Kelly's award on his behalf.

Robert Dunnett, husband of Amanda and father of Charlotte and Emma, expressed his heartfelt thanks to the three men, and his gratitude to Councillor Roger Manning, Mr John Burr, Director of Highways at KCC, and the Linkhill Road "gang" for their efforts to make the road safe, which it seemed were now about to bear fruit.

According to the latest information from Kent Highways, resurfacing of the road at Linkhill is due to start in December, when the new interactive sign will also arrive. After the water mains works are completed along the whole stretch of the Rye Road (along which a 30mph limit will operate), expected to be next March, the 40mph limit will be introduced.

A very big Thank You to John Goodman and the parish council for supporting the Linkhill Road Group's campaign and for hosting the awards ceremony, including providing the drinks; and to Jeanne Smith for the table full of delicious savoury treats.

Fascinating Facts about Sandhurst

The Late Miss Halifax's Tour around Sandhurst as retraced by Bob Houlden Meagrims Hill The West Way now comes out to the main road and degenerates into a footpath. Before climbing the stile let us cast our eyes up Meagrims Hill. I always understood that the hill got its name from somebody's horse having an attack of meagrims or staggers while going up it; but on old maps it is marked as Meagram's Hill so I am afraid that is just a tale. Another story, for which I cannot find any proof, concerns the posts and chains on either side of the road. Apparently a sailor from Rye was travelling up the hill on a dark night, perhaps a bit the worse for having celebrated his return to port, and fell into the ditch first on one side and then the other. These accidents affected him so strongly that he is said to have left a sum of money to erect and keep in order the post and chains that now guard the road. (Miss Halifax's story is correct. There was a trust for this purpose, I recall when going through old files in the Parish office when I was a councillor, which from memory was initially administered by Northiam Parish Council and subsequently transferred to KCC.- BH) At the top of the hill is the old horse trough. I can just remember the driver of the old 'bus from Tenterden to Hawkhurst stopping here to let his old black horses drink. But now, of course, it is dry and filled up with rubbish. West Way Retracing our steps down the hill we get back on to the Roman Road by taking the footpath at the back of Bayford House. This runs in a truly Roman fashion straight to Sandhurst Cross. When I was working on Mr Baker's farm during the war I can remember them trying to plough across part of the old road and how the plough kept jumping in the air because it was still too hard. Miss Baker and I used to look hopefully for coins or bits of pottery but all we ever found were lumps of iron set in the bubbles as it had come from smelting. Then we thought these lumps were from iron foundries that flourished here in later times. There was a furnace only two miles away at Gun Green (Miss Halifax added a signed margin note: "Furnace Farm near Park Farm, where we lived 1939-45). But recently I have discovered that the whole of this Roman road was metalled with cinders and dross from the smelting heaps. Our finds were very much more ancient than we thought. The West Way leads us straight across that big flat field known as School Field. because there was once a school here. After touching the modern road it is not so easy to trace except on old maps, but the line passes north of the church, (I think she means west and not north -BH) down the hill again to cross the Kent Ditch. anciently known as the Kennet. Where it passes into Bodiam Parish we leave it. **Old Sandhurst** Now at Sandhurst Cross we come to the real old Sandhurst. On old maps as late as 1796 the Cross is marked as Sandhurst proper and this part where we are now (Sandhurst today) is Cowbeech Green. It almost seems as if then there was little connection between the two places, at least socially. I dare say the inhabitants of Sandhurst (Cross) looked with deepest suspicion on those foreigners down at Cowbeech Green.

Rev Charles Hill highlights the report: Perceptions of Ethics in the City Today - by St Paul's Institute

Professionals in the Financial Services sector believe that City bond traders, FTSE Chief Executives and stock brokers are paid too much, teachers are paid too little and that there is too great a gap between rich and poor in the UK, according to a survey carried out by ComRes on behalf of St Paul's Institute.

Marking the 25th anniversary of the financial 'Big Bang', the survey also indicates that the majority of Financial Services professionals do not know that the London Stock Exchange's motto is 'My Word is My Bond' and many think that deregulation of financial markets results in less ethical behaviour.

The survey of 515 professionals working in the Financial Services sector in London carried out online by ComRes between 30th August and 12th September 2011 also found that:

- The majority of FS professional think that bankers, stock brokers, FTSE 100 chief executives, lawyers and city bond traders are paid too much.
- Salary and bonuses' are the most important motivation for professionals working in the FS sector in London for 2 in 3 (64%) participants. 'Enjoyment of the work' comes a distant second.

 \Rightarrow 75% agree that there is too great a gap between rich and poor.


- Only 14% of respondents correctly indicated the motto of the London Stock Exchange ("My Word is My Bond").
- Many are not familiar with what happened after the financial 'Big Bang': 1 in 3 disagree that the financial markets were deregulated
- ♦ More than two-thirds (69%) did not know that the financial Big Bang was in 1986.

The majority of respondents feel that their companies maintain high ethical standards that are broadly in line with their personal moral standards.

Tips from the Garden Shed DECEMBER

Winter pruning of fruit trees is a satisfying job and it is a good time to carry out any major pruning of ornamental deciduous trees and shrubs, the plants

are dormant, and with no leaves it is much easier to see what needs to be pruned out. Start by removing any dead and diseased wood, moving on to any crossing branches that are rubbing together, cutting out whole shoots to a joint whenever possible. If the plant is taking up too much space it can be trimmed but try to open up the centre of the plant to allow air to circulate, take your time, stand back and consider the effect that removing a branch will have on the overall appearance before making the cut. Has your garden room for some winter shrubs? December is an excellent time to buy a plant. If the ground is wet and cold, pop them in along a path to avoid compacting the soil and position them in your chosen spot in the Spring. They will hold over very well if their roots are covered in soil, a practice known as 'heeling in'.

Suggested winter shrubs: Mahonia (Charity), Viburnum (Bodnantense), Ilex Holly (Landsworth New Silver), Cotoneaster Frigidus (Fructu Lutea), Eleagnus (Gilt Edge), Aucuba Japonica (Variegata).

The No5 is a far quicker route and one could easily walk or get the free bus to Maidstone Market.




