"Advent"

Where does the time go? I know it's a cliché, something that people always say, but the older I get the quicker time seems to pass by! And here we are at the start of Advent once more, and so Christmas is just around the corner.

Are you ready for it this year; Christmas, that is? We know exactly when it is; it never moves in the calendar; yet it still seems to catch us out every year. Never enough time to do all the preparation: to get the extra food - always too much; the extra drink in – that bottle of sweet sherry for dear Aunt Rose....that you'll never drink yourself! Off to the "nativity", the Carol service, the Crib service, midnight Communion. The presents to get and wrap, the cards to write and send; the decorations to put up; the tree to bring home and put in place – having moved your furniture around the room to make space for it; getting the lights out for the tree - testing them to see if they still work! Advent is a time to set aside to do something about being "ready" – as best we can; a time when we can look at what we are really like; at how we really behave with others; a time when we can recognise the parts of us that are real, that are the true self.....but we hope others won't see. It is a time when we can look for the unclean things in our life, and get on with cleaning it up. Finding those dirty mugs in our lives, washing them up, and putting them away.....clean, sorted and ready for the important visitor.

Amongst all the busyness of the excitement, the planning and the organisation for Christmas, please try to find some time this Advent to be ready to meet with the meaning of Christ-mas.

A couple of years ago I had the pleasure of showing Ptolemy around St. Nicholas Church when the PCC were interviewing for a new architect for the church it was a most interesting couple of hours with Ptolemy pointing out evidence of long gone wall paintings near the chancel. Unfortunately Ptolemy withdrew from the selection process due to the pressure of work he said but we now know that others with more influence than your PCC had designs on his time and talents! Ptolemy, we understand, was summoned for a weekend at Balmoral and we later learned that Her Majesty the Queen had appointed him "Surveyor of the Fabric" at Westminster Abbey; Her Majesty's gain and our loss no doubt.

Ptolemy's son wrote in the visitor's book a charming comment for a 10 year old: "9/11/14 - Tobias Dean aged 10 – Wadhurst – Daddy member of Westminster Abbey. I love this church and we loved the wildlife" *Bob Houlden*

Perhaps if this is already the case, or in the process of doing so, take a little time to check the security of the outbuilding and its contents. What property is being put away that is high value? Should it go missing could you give an adequate description with any serial numbers available? All aspects of home security should be evaluated especially as Christmas approaches. At this time of year we are all starting to think about presents, keeping extra cash and stocking up for the festive season ahead. Make sure that it is you and your loved ones who will enjoy this time and not somebody unknown!

Burglars mess with your head not just your home

Kent Police is asking residents to take simple measures to protect themselves from becoming a victim of burglary.

Overall the force has seen a positive decrease in this type of crime, but statistics show that the number of reports can increase during the autumn months. Most burglaries happen during daylight hours, with offences often peaking at about 11am, so while you're hard at work, burglars are too. Most burglars are opportunists, which means it is important to ensure the security measures taken at night are also taken before you leave home in the morning.

From experience, the police know burglary can leave victims feeling scared and anxious long after the crime has been committed.

To help reduce the risk of becoming a burglary victim officers are asking residents to work with them by following these key principles:

Light it

- Light dark or hidden entrances with low wattage security lighting
- Use timer switches to turn on lights/radio invest in a 24-hour segment timer
- for under £5. Remember to use an energy efficient light bulb **Lock it**
- Keep your front and back windows and doors locked (double lock uPVC)
- Keep side gates locked burglars often break into homes from the garden where they have less chance of being seen
- If bins are emptied before you leave for work return them to your garden they can be used as climbing aids if left on display
- Instead use bins as obstructions in side entrances
- Trim high hedging/plant growth they could provide cover for a burglar
- Secure your garage and shed items inside can be just as tempting and can even be used to break in
- If you get the train ensure your car is locked, windows are closed and keys are not left on display through windows
- Don't keep large amounts of money or jewellery at home. If you have to, use a safe that is stored out of sight and fixed to a solid floor

The Mayor of Tunbridge Wells Christmas Toy Appeal

The Toy Appeal helps local families living in the Borough of Tunbridge Wells whose circumstances (whether temporary or permanent) limit their ability to buy gifts for their children at Christmas. The children are referred to the Appeal by health visitors, social workers, family support workers and other charitable organisations. Each child receives about 3 presents each and the feedback from parents and carers last year was incredibly positive.

Last year 267 children were referred to the Appeal and we are expecting numbers to increase this year. The way it works is that between Saturday 15 November and Saturday 13 December there will be large decorated boxes displayed in many collection points in and around the town, including Paddock Wood, Cranbrook and other various locations within and around Tunbridge Wells and some venues will feature Christmas trees with tags that offer ideas for suitable gifts within a specific age range. We then hope that people will donate new or unused toys and deposit them at these collection points, (Weald Information Centre Cranbrook and Weald Sports Centre Cranbrook) where they are collected and distributed by volunteers working in rooms donated by The Big Yellow Self Storage. *The Mayor's Toy Appeal was started by ClIr Arthur Sayer with St George's Community Children's Project in 1989 and continues to thrive under the organisation of Pam Bridges and her small army of volunteers, with great support from the Mayor's Office and St George's*.

Tips from the Garden Shed December

DECIDUOUS HEDGES - are yours gaining in width every year?

Without realising most hedges manage to become wider every year, taking up more space and becoming difficult to trim. Winter, while the plants are dormant is an excellent opportunity to reduce an older established hedge by cutting back each side, even if this means cutting into old wood, leaving the width narrower at the top than the bottom. Tapering in this way will protect the hedge from damage due to heavy snowfalls. Finally, the top can be cut to your desired height.

Winter is an excellent time to plant a new hedge, leaving it to establish a good root system, eg. two years, before beginning to trim and shape in the manner outlined. Regular trimming, perhaps twice each year, will produce new shoots helping to form the desired thick and wedge-shaped hedge .John Everett

What Child Is This?

The son of a surgeon, William Chatterton Dix was an insurance executive whose fame largely rests with his contributions to the Christmas carol repertoire. Born in 1837 in Bristol, England, he was bequeathed the middle name of Chatterton in honor of Thomas Chatterton, a poet whose biography was penned by his father. Although the better part of his professional life involved marine insurance, Dix always nurtured a great love for poetry and hymns.



His interest in both was accentuated at the age of twenty-nine when a near fatal illness and severe depression confined him to bed for months. It was during this period when Dix wrote most of the forty hymns credited to him, including As With Gladness Men of Old and more notably his carol gem What Child Is This?

The lyrics for What Child Is This? were initially part of The Manager Throne, a six-stanza poem penned by Dix. The insurance manager later took three of its stanzas and adapted them to the popular 16th-century tune of Greensleeves. In 1871 both text and tune, the latter arranged by the wellrespected John Stainer, were published in Bramley & Stainer's Christmas Carols, New and Old, a widely circulated compilation.

The beautiful Greensleeves folk melody dates from Elizabethan times, perhaps even earlier, and reputedly it had less respectable lyrics sung to it in several settings. One of the earliest references to it was in 1580, and it was twice mentioned in Shakespeare's comedy play, The Merry Wives of Windsor. In the 1642 New Christmas Carols black-letter edition, a variant tune of Greensleeves was used in the carol The Old Year Now Away Is Fled. Strains of the melody were also heard in John Gay's 1728 satirical ballad opera, The Beggar's Opera.

The providence of history is such that Greensleeves might be less well known if it were not for a strange illness that befell William Chatterton Dix. His effort to string religious pearls from the tune and his lengthy The Manger Throne ultimately prove successful. And because of his reverential treatment of the Nativity theme, the beloved What Child Is This? has become a perennial Christmas favorite for churches, concert halls, and carolers at home.


The meeting of the Parish Council to set our precept will be held on Tuesday 16th December at 7pm .

TSCW Trust

The Tenterden Schools Christian Worker Trust (TSCWT) has been in existence for nearly 3 years now and I have been employed for slightly less than that. The purpose of the trust was to provide a worker in Homewood School, full time, to work in a number of areas including Assemblies, Mentoring, Focus Days, ERS (Ethical and Religious Studies) and support for Christian staff and students. The original funding was for 3 years which came from Churches and Individuals in Tenterden and surrounding areas as well as a



significant sum from the old Tenterden Deanery. Thank you to both Benenden and Sandhurst church's for their support in this work. As we have sought over the past 6 months, and continue to do so, to find funding to continue this good work in Homewood and beyond it has allowed us to reflect on the things we have achieved and the doors that have opened for us.

Ministering in a school environment is a privilege - with 2300 students on-site and over 250 staff, opportunities for working with different groups in different ways have been exciting. I have been involved in mentoring students individually over periods of time who have been through tough times at home or in school; I have been working with the ERS team to engage students anew in this subject, and we have seen numbers taking the subject at GCSE and A level rise; planning our assemblies across the year has enabled me to ensure we are giving students time to think and reflect, in a busy school environment; running our programme of services at Harvest, Remembrance, Christmas and Easter for the school has made it possible to re-imagine what church may look like to a teenager.

Over the past 2 years we have also been looking at how we can minister in the primary schools in Homewood's catchment area. Last year we had 53 schools send students to Homewood, and whilst it isn't possible to have a presence in all these schools we can work with local people and churches to support their work; I have done so in Benenden and Sandhurst primary schools. In June and July 2014 I visited 16 primary schools speaking to over 400 Year 6 students about the transition to secondary school. This was a great opportunity to engage early with students coming to Homewood but also to support those who may be going to another school.

Our hope and prayer is that the work of the Trust will continue to grow both in Homewood and further and deeper into the primary schools surrounding it. We have been fortunate to receive a grant from the Diocese of Canterbury of $\pounds21,000$ over the next 3 years which has provided the cornerstone for us to continue. However we value more than ever individuals and churches coming alongside us and praying for the Trust as well as giving financially if they feel able to.

Getting the Message

The Annunciation in words and pictures

Throughout the centuries the story of the Annunciation has been a rich source of inspiration for artists of many traditions, including contemporary artists from very different cultures. Some of their paintings are very familiar to us; others we may not have come across before, and we may find them surprising, even disturbing.



St Luke's account of the Annunciation, of the angel appearing to Mary with a very surprising message, consists almost

entirely of dialogue, just the angel speaking to Mary, and Mary's reply, with no description of where the event took place, or what Mary was doing at the time. This leaves us free to imagine the event in our own way, and for our own reasons – and this is what these artists have done. These are not just paintings, they are attempts by artists to understand, and help others to understand; to tell the story in a way that brings new insights and ways of seeing.

We shall be looking at these paintings not only to enjoy them for their own sake, as works of art, but also to consider how they can help us to discover how God might speak to us.
