Learning from the Past

"Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom." (James 3:13)

As we commemorated the 100th anniversary of the end of the "war to end all wars", I found these words poignant for our future, as we remembered 4yrs, 3mths and 2wks of a bloody, horrific and tragic event in world history that cost men, boys - whole families and communities - their lives.

To say that that war was wrong, would take away the value of the millions of individual lives that were lost and the millions of lives affected by loved ones killed, gassed or injured. On the eve of the Armistice, 10th November 1918, a sermon was preached by Revd. T.A. Lacey, Canon of Worcester; in it he said that war, "is the fruit of the folly and the sin of men." But sometimes it is right to stand up and maintain important principles. It is right to stand up against Dictators or terrorism or extremism, even though there might be a huge cost. But "principles" can be very costly, and lead us to make decisions which, if we were to look back on them and analysis them, we can often think, "How did we get here?" Sound familiar?

So how do we see the folly of doing something, "whatever the cost", before it's too late? That is wisdom. Wisdom is knowing when to make a stand, when it is right to fight; and when it is right to, "Let it go". Wisdom comes from looking back and learning from the past and applying it.

If we believe that God is the God of creation, he is the God of all creation. That means he is the God of those whom we might find ourselves fighting against or disputing with as we stand up for a principle. Both sides in the Great War were, predominantly, Christian societies. Both sides would have been praying to God for victory – to the same God! Both sides had much in common.

If wisdom is about applying to life what we learn in life, when are we going to grow in wisdom and learn from Jesus when he was asked, "Which commandment is the most important?" He replied, "Love the Lord your God. And love your neighbour as yourself." However, "loving your neighbour as yourself" is not an easy thing to learn; and certainly is not an easy thing to put into practice! That, though, is what God hopes we will-all eventually learn.

Whilst there are times when we have to stand by a principle, perhaps the world would be better if all humanity could stand by a higher principle: with all learning to live together "loving our neighbour as ourselves". Until that day, God still cries at what His creation does to one another, as both sides in a conflict suffer. As we celebrate again the birth of Jesus this Christmas time, let us remember the wisdom that baby brought to us.

The evening service was even more moving and equally well attended. The church was beautifully decorated for the service and candles, lit by Lynn, for every name on the memorial read out by the chairman of the parish council.

After the service we went into Church Field where lots more people joined in. After Godfrey Bland read the tribute to the fallen, Adam Kerry lit the Beacon to join the chain of beacons throughout the country and then the bells rang for the Peace.

If you go up to St Nicholas Church you will see the photograph and details of Sapper Laurence Phipps on his grave which is just inside the churchyard on your right. We hope to have details of other dead servicemen as soon as possible.





Apple Soup

One large eating apple per person,

butter stock veg or chicken or bouillon powder, ground ginger

Method

Peel and core apples and cut into chunks. Fry in a little butter. Add ginger, one level teaspoon for 8 people, or more if liked. Stir apples so that ginger disperses. Add stock and cover and simmer gently until the apples are cooked. Process and add more stock if too thick.


Parsnip Soup

Method

Sweat all in saucepan with knob of butter. Add pint stock. Simmer until soft then liquidise. Add water or milk to thin if required.

Coventry Carol

One of the great tragedies of the New Testament and the gospel of St. Matthew 3:16-18 was the slaughter of Bethlehem's male children two years and younger at the time of Jesus' birth.

About fourteen centuries later, an anonymous poet composed a fitting lullaby-like song to commemorate this heart-wrenching event. Titled "Lullay, Thou Tiny Little Child," better known as the Coventry Carol, rarely has a lyric been written that captures the essence of the St. Matthew narrative. When it was coupled with a haunting melody, the Christmas carol repertoire was instantly bequeathed one of its most beautiful gems.



The oldest known lyrical text of this ancient carol was edited in 1534 by Robert Croo, a regular participant in the mystery plays staged by the local craft guilds of Coventry, England. The tune as we know it today, however, dates from 1591. The mournful carol was one of three songs included in the Pageant of the Shearman and Tailors' Guilds, a mystery play initially sponsored by Queen Margaret in 1456, and later witnessed by King Henry VII and King Richard III.

The mystery plays of Coventry began in 1416. Like those of other English towns, they presented Biblical stories in the vernacular tongue, rather than in Latin, and they were quite popular with ordinary people, most of whom were illiterate. Their powerful musical and literary material was performed either on a fixed stage where people went to see them or in a procession where a series of scenes ("pageants") passed by on moving carts drawn by either men or horses with people looking on. These moving carts were generally comprised of two stories: the top floor for use as a performance stage, and the bottom floor serving as a curtained dressing room. As it moved along the streets and narrow passageways, the procession would stop at different places, or stations, whenever they found another eager audience awaiting their arrival The theme of the mystery plays was usually about the Life of Jesus Christ. An essential element for many of them was the singing of carols. In fact, carols were so popular that near riots would occur if they were not sung. Unfortunately, much of the carol music from the mystery plays has been lost.

The mystery play enactment of the Massacre of the Innocents closely followed the text of St. Matthew's gospel: the tyrant, Herod, called the people to order, and immediately after the carol verses were sung by men dressed like the women of Bethlehem, Herod's soldiers arrived on the scene.

Although sung by men during the era of the mystery plays, the Norman Luboff Choir's all-female haunting a cappella performance of the "Coventry Carol" more acutely captures the pathos and profound grief of the women of Bethlehem for the loss of their innocent children.

Sophie Hill couldn't be with us for our November meeting so Sheila Hume from 'Blue Hen Flowers' Benenden stepped in at short notice.

Attendance was good, it was a very interesting talk and demonstration showing us how to make dried flower wreaths.

Sheila is a grower on a small holding in Benenden, a member of 'Flowers from the Farm' and also runs workshops.

The first dried flower wreath she made was an indoor one, the ring was made from willow and once the circular shape was made she tied on a beautiful selection of dried flowers including bracken, ivy, hornbeam, roses, hydrangea, hops, larkspur, lavender, camellia and many more. The dried flowers were tied on using raffia and it was all natural. The finished wreath looked spectacular.

The second one was a Christmas wreath, this time Shelia used wire and purchased the rings, oranges and spruce. To start, she covered the ring in moss and then added small bunches of different foliage giving a variety of colours and textures. Once the whole ring was covered, she added feathers and oranges. The foliage included bay, myrtle, spruce, laurel, holly, yew, alder, figs, magnolia heads, cones and many more. Again, the finished Christmas wreath was spectacular and I couldn't decide which one was the best.

From the Garden Shed SPRING 2019 - 'Bring-it-on'

Induce the daffodil (Narcissus) season prematurely with the early flowering varieties, 'January Gold' and 'Spring Dawn' a golden yellow and pale-flowered mixture; both only 12" high, frost and rabbit proof. There may be a bargain



available with the bulb buying season coming to an end. These bulbs are made for the impatient; plant right now and admire January, February and March. The bulbs are planted (pointed-end up) 4-6" deep/ 3-4" apart, and very easily grown in any reasonable soil. Aim to plant in groups of 5-6 and typically 25-50 bulbs will be required to make splash.



Healthy Hearts Talk

North Ridge Medical Practice Patient Participation Group held a Healthy Hearts Talk at Bowles Lodge on Thursday 25th October. 
